Earlene Hilton, a gracious donor to The Mitney
Project is a former resident of Emanuel Street in the
West End community of Georgetown. It is not
because of her support of Mitney that she is
highlighted in this issue, but because of her long
standing commitment to the positive development
of children and youths. She has put her money
where her mouth is and began doing so in 1979.
Quick to say that God ordered her to do this work
she founded "Uplifting Children" by recruiting kids in
her neighborhood and giving them lessons about
economics. To help teach the value of money and of
saving, each child was given a roll of quarters to
begin an account and watch it grow.

Ms. Hilton writes encouraging poetry which she recites in various venues; she hosts a radio show in New York underscoring the responsibility adults have for the positive development of children. Arguably, her most influencial project is her summer camp, the most recent of which ended this past July. She saves money from her social security check (She is a retired crossing guard for the City of New York.) to fund this two week camp in her home town. Summer after summer she brings children from New York to join local children in a summer camp which she organizes ahead of time. The kids stay at the Hampton Inn, attend pep talks, swim, and go on day trips. Visits to the Avery Institute in Charleston, local plantations, Penn Center in Beaufort, horseback riding in Salters are but a few of the things they get to do with the Queen. Every day begins with daily devotions. This summer's camp ended with graduation and monetary gifts

bestowed on graduates. What an inspiration!

Mitney was recently honored by a visit from Pete Dubay. Mr. Dubay was the project's liason with Rotary International and was vital to the establishment of LOG ON! Two years ago, Mitney received its first grant award from Rotary which allowed for the purchase of all computers in the LOG ON! community lab.

STREETSCAPE IMPROVEMENTS CONTINUE

Streetscape improvements will soon continue down Front Street. If you would like to see the plans, go by Lane Mixon's office in the old Highway Department Building. Although prices have risen, we expect to have driveways in front of houses from Fraser to Congdon, re-do sidewalks, install decorative street lights and improve curbing from Merriman to Alex Alford Drive. All of this resulted from a request from Mitney that the City of Georgetown apply for a grant offered by the S.C. Department of Commerce. Having received the grant, the project was funded for two years at 1 million dollars. The first half of the grant provided beautification already visible between Front and Congdon. Phase II will begin very soon according to the grant administrator, Sarah Smith of the Waccamaw Regional Council of Governments.
